

Spray-On Chrome: A New Process for Antique-Car Applications

orward looking antique-car enthusiasts usually welcome new products from the wide variety of suppliers and manufacturers that serve the hobby. Their enthusiasm can be especially compelling when a new product can save them money.

"Check out the video and let me know what you think," requested a fellow hobbyist of a Gettysburg Region member earlier this year. He was referring to a video on a popular antique-car internet site. That collector, who lived out west, had found that chrome-plating shops were hard to find in California, due to strong environmental concerns and resulting protective regulations that had apparently driven business elsewhere. He had been finding that complete rechroming for a car was costing near \$20,000.

Though the cost of rechroming is considerably more affordable in car-friendly Pennsylvania, it can still be a major expense in restoration. A new technique holds interesting promise. Though this new process isn't suited for everything, it actually gives much more flexibility in some regards.

Coat of Chrome is a company located in Wind Gap, Pennsylvania, a small town north of the Allentown-Bethlehem area and conveniently located for the state's numerous antique car fans. Don Pirre is the owner and proprietor there, and *The Gas Buggy Gazette* contacted him recently to find out more about the process.

"It's something on the order of 10 years, which is relatively new," Don Pirre responds when asked how new the process is. "It's really an extension of an older process, by which glass is made into a mirror....What's new and different here is that, instead of having to put this directly to glass, and glass only, it's able to go on a base coat that you can paint on lots of different surfaces." Much as mirrors are silvered, this new process applies a flawless reflective coating to other materials such as plastic, fiberglass, metal, and even wood.

Indeed, this promising product has been tried in Jay Leno's Garage, the large California collection of just about everything automotive. It was Mr. Leno himself who recommended that a club member look into the process, and subsequently gave him Don Pirre's name

and telephone number.

Don Pirre is quick to point out that the process doesn't give just a vague impression of chrome plating; rather, it exactly duplicates the look of chrome plating or colored chrome finishes. Moreover, it is often one-third to one-half the cost of the usual triple-layer electroplating process.

So how does it work?

"Typically someone comes to me with metal parts that have been chromed originally," Don says. "They're probably going to be pitted, at least corroded in some way. The chromium electroplating

that's on there is very hard, so it has to be more than just sanded by sandpaper. You have to sand-blast it quite aggressively, so that you roughen up the surface really well; then you can prime it with some etch primer first. Then you can coat it again with primers—high-build primers to do some filling. If some of the filling requirements are excessive, you can do body work, the same as you would do when painting the fender of a car." All imperfections must be eliminated so they do not show up in the finished piece.

Once all the prep work is done, "and you have a nice smooth finish like it was going to be painted, then instead of painting it, I can take that piece and get a base coat sprayed on. Next, this base coat can be treated through a series of chemical rinses that I have, to allow silver to be deposited on it. Silver plates chemically instead of electrolytically: it attaches through chemical reaction."

"Silver is sprayed in the sense that it comes out of spray guns, but it's a fluid, so unlike a paint where a mist hits the surface and dries almost on contact, this is a spray of fluids that rinse over the part. It's almost like putting the part under a shower head....And like I said, there's a series of these rinses and through the succession of these rinses, a silver plating is deposited on that base coat. Then what it needs after that is a top coat to protect it, so a fairly conventional acrylic urethane clear coat will go over the silver metalizing. At that point, you have the same protection as a good paint finish." In describing his work, Don sounds careful and meticulous, and he says that the finish can be applied not just to steel, but to pot metal (typically hard to electroplate) and aluminum as well.

Any substrate—even stone, ceramic, and cloth—can receive the process, though artists, not car restorers, would be more likely to use such a capability. But the method's applicability to plastic parts may suit the needs of 1960's, '70's and '80's collector cars.

"A lot of plastic from those 1960's, 1970's cars had a vapor deposition of aluminum on the plastic," Don explains. "That basically wears off from the elements, oxidation from the air. The aluminum basically disintegrates. That's why you see a kind of yellowness left behind." Haven't we all seen interior plastic arm rests with such a malady? "Yes, I can readily redo those kinds of parts. The vacuum metalizing can be sanded off; I can rehabilitate the plastic, fixing cracks and things like that. Don explains that cracks are fixed with an isocyanate type of very strong adhesive, and the isocyanate can be strengthened with some filler in the mixture. "And then after some priming and fine sanding to the repaired surfaces, I can deposit the base coat, the silver metalizing, the clear coat, and it will look as good as new." Though

the process differs from the original, the resulting appearance will be the same.

An interesting feature of this process is that other colors, even different colors on the same piece, can be achieved. Brass color, gold color, copper color, are done through careful color selection and tinting of the clear-coat. Even colors such as red or blue chrome can be done for specialty applications. And through masking, more than one color can appear on the same piece. Colored lettering can even be done for more creative needs. The making of spectacular trophies comes immediately to mind.

Since the product is essentially a mirror-smooth silvering protected by a clear coat, how well does it hold up? Does it hold up as well as paint?

"That's the way I'd have to answer that: As well as paint does," Don replies. "I do tell customers they ought to be cautious about where the piece is going to go, if it's going to take a beating, like on the front end of an every-day use vehicle." Don says that the process is perfect for interior chrome parts, and exterior parts that aren't likely to get road rash. Bumpers, subject to more abuse, probably wouldn't be the place for spray-on chrome, since any nick in the clear coat-ing would appear magnified by the chrome's reflectivity. But he has done taillights, trim rings, bodyside moldings, and windshield frames, for example, for various antique cars.

The Jay Leno garage has used the process—done by a now-defunct California shop—for items such as motorcycle parts, 1966 Ford window switches, and a 1956 Chevrolet hood ornament, and they are evidently satisfied with the result, as Mr. Leno has made the aforesaid video, talks about this new development enthusiastically, and now refers people to Don Pirre. Coat of Chrome's professionalism must be becoming well-known as well: Don has used the method for 100 chrome parts on an old race car belonging to football coach Dick Vermeil; has plated some items for Disney movies and Disney World; has done a C3PO (Star Wars) costume; and even plated clothing for the Victoria's Secret Fashion Show.

ot only does 2015 mark the Western PA Region's 65th Anniversary, it also marks the 50th year the Region has offered the opportunity for people to win an antique Chance Car. In the beginning, the Chance Car was a Model A Ford. Over the years other Chance Cars included: 1948, '55 and '57 Chevys, 1977, '78 and '84 Corvettes, 1967, '77 and '81 Camaros, 1970 Dodge Challengers, a 1979 Pontiac Firebird and 1965, '66 and '67 Mustangs. Our 50th Chance Car is a Region first, a 1988 Corvette Convertible with the Greenwood Package. It comes from Monroeville, PA, and has been in the same family since it was given from husband to wife as a birthday gift in 1988. It was very well-maintained and has only 35,000 gently driven miles on it. The Greenwood Package was a Chevrolet-endorsed, dealer-installed option, which included a spoiler and body ground treatments.

Two People & Stuff Fit Nicely

Prior to purchasing this Corvette Convertible, a major concern was being able to fit two people and ticket selling equipment - folding table, chairs and ticket box into a limited cargo area behind the seats. Member Chuck Speicher has a similar 1995 Corvette Convertible and came up with an excellent solution utilizing a "roll up" camping table which fits into a sack. When set up the table is 31 x 31 inches square. This table along with two folding chairs, ticket box and a fold-up tripod shade umbrella fit neatly into the Corvette Convertible cargo area, leaving just enough room for a bag of donuts or a small sack of sandwiches. With equipment properly stowed

away, two members will be able to ride comfortably to any ticket selling venue.

We will have the Corvette at the Region's monthly meeting on April 21st and demonstrate how these items fit into the car (weather permitting).

1915 Dodge Brothers Touring Car with Local Roots Helped Celebrate Dodge Centennial at the AACA Museum



From pieces to perfect - The 1915 Dodge Brothers Touring Car once owned by Rupert Martinko stands restored and proud.

A little over fifteen years ago, WPR member Rupert Martinko, found a 1915 Dodge Brothers Touring Car in Whitehall, PA near McKeesport, while he was working on a house in the area. The owner was an elderly gentleman, who was trying to restore it. Prior to taking the car apart, the owner had shown it at some local events. He had the engine rebuilt and the body off of the frame. Unfortunately, he

began to loose his vision, so he decided to sell the car, and Rupert decided to purchase it.

Rupert then got together with a friend. Bolted the body on the frame. Loaded the Dodge Brothers Touring Car on a trailer and took it home. When he got it home, he suspended the body in the garage and made sure all of the parts were carefully preserved with oil until he had time to work on it.

Other projects soon found their priorities, and not being a "Dodge guy", the Touring Car remained in pieces. Finally, Rupert decided that it would be better to sell the Dodge Brothers car. He placed an ad in *Hemmings* and got calls from all over the USA from people wanting to buy parts. Although "parting out" the car would have been more lucrative, Rupert decided that it was too nice of a car, and should be sold to someone who would finish the restoration.

Ultimately, Rupert sold the entire car to Daniel Kerr of Russelton, PA, who is an officer in the Dodge Brothers Club. Daniel had previously restored 38 Dodge cars. This restoration took two years with amazing results. Rupert's careful preservation of the car's parts with oil paid off. The car came out so nice that it was displayed at the AACA Museum in Hershey beside a Dodge Viper to celebrate Dodge's Centennial in 2014.

This wonderful hundred-year-old touring car is now back in Mr. Kerr's collection. He has contacted Rupert offering to take him for a ride in it this spring. What a treat that will be.
